Natasha Shines On

"I try to imagine what kind of person I would be without playing the cello and I really can't."

In the beginning, the lesson room was dark and dreary and Natasha Rosario's first cello was made of paper. But Community MusicWorks turned on an inner light that shines through everything Natasha has accomplished in the eleven years since her entrance to the program.

Natasha was seven years old when her mother signed her up for lessons. Natasha admits that she was an impatient student. "I wanted to run fast before I could walk. When you play an instrument, it takes years to be as good as the people you watch every day. I've learned to be patient with myself." That patience, she says, helped her with academics, sports and life in general: "I learned to persevere."

Today, at age 18, Natasha is poised to step onto a new stage after winning early acceptance into Brown University's highly selective pre-med program. She knows CMW will always inform who she is, just as much as her four siblings – all CMW participants – and her mother have. "CMW is like family," she says. "I grew up with it." It will be especially hard to leave Phase II behind. Natasha says she will miss deeply the shared meals.
